











GABRIEL DUMONT 1837 - 1906

ised on the prairies. Dumont became the greatest of Métis buffalo hunters. As the herds diminished in 1870s he and other plains dwelling Métis established manent settlements on the South Saskatchewan. In 34 he brought Louis Riel from exile to lead the Métis their dealings with the government, and when armed afflict ensued. Gabriel was their military commander, reed into exile, he foured with Buffalo Bill's Wild st Show, and pled the cause of his people in eastern nada before returning to the Saskatchewan in the 90s to resume his place as a leader of the Métis mmunity.












Pat at Heritage Lodge
